The past year has marked extraordinary growth for The Bronfman Fellowship. At a time of profound global uncertainty, political polarization, war in Israel, and a rise in anti-Semitism around the world, our work cultivating pluralistic leadership has never been more urgently needed. Drawing from 39 years of experience nurturing Jewish community and leadership, we expanded our reach in 2024: deepening the core Fellowship experience for teens from North America and Israel, launching a groundbreaking new campus program for Jewish college students, strengthening the global impact of our 1,500+ alumni network, and continuing to cultivate the Israeli-North American relationship.

Broadening Our Portfolio, Expanding Worldviews

The Bronfman Fellowship cultivates Jewish leaders in Israel and North America, providing spaces for them to imagine authentic leadership and foster pluralism. We began as a summer program, but today, our impact is much deeper and focuses on four initiatives: The Bronfman Fellowship, Amitei Bronfman, Campus Commons, and the Alumni Leadership Network.

The Fellowship Year

Each year, the Bronfman Fellowship brings together a diverse and talented cohort of Jewish teenagers from North America and Israel, equipping them with Jewish wisdom, transformative experiences, deep mentorship, and a powerful peer community. At the heart of our approach is a profound commitment to Positive Pluralism and Existential Torah – engaging participants in open, honest, and courageous dialogue across difference, grounded in text and tradition, to explore the most compelling questions of the human experience.

Fellows emerge empowered to bring their full selves into the world and to lead with integrity, compassion, and creativity, both in their own communities and their careers. Embodying the Bronfman approach, these leaders evolve into some of the most inspiring Jewish innovators and influencers of our time.

Let's take a look at highlights from our recent cohorts.

2023 Cohort Highlights

Our 2023 North American Fellows gathered in January for the program's first-ever West Coast Winter Seminar at Urban Adamah in Berkeley, California, immersing in a culture of innovation and creativity. As always, the Winter Seminar provided opportunities for connection, reflection, deep text study, and immersive discussions. Immersed in Jewish learning, music, art, and communal reflection, Fellows explored themes of identity and resilience—deepened by open and thoughtful discussions around the Israel-Hamas war and how it has impacted their lives.

The Israeli Amitim had equally impactful and meaningful opportunities for exploration throughout their Fellowship year. In addition, shortly before Passover, they traveled to the U.S., reuniting with the 2023 Fellows at the Holmes Retreat Center in upstate New York.

This year the Israeli delegation was likely the only group of Israeli teens to travel to the U.S. since the war began, and we increased security and support for their trip. For many, this journey provided strength and healing as they reflected on the changes they've undergone since the war and felt the embrace of the American Jewish community.

2024 Cohort Highlights

Our 38th North American cohort included Fellows from 10 states and D.C., representing the full spectrum of Jewish identity and observance, including Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Just Jewish and secular/culturally Jewish. Approximately 60% of them attended public or non-sectarian private schools, with about 40% attending either yeshiva or pluralistic day schools. Nearly a quarter of the Fellows were from households that include other faith backgrounds.

In Israel, despite immense challenges—including staff serving on reserve duty and applicants evacuating homes—we had a record number of applicants and 22 remarkable teens from diverse backgrounds were selected for the 2024 Amitim cohort.

In North America, we held a retreat for the educational team in May. The esteemed educational team for 2024 included many alumni:

- **Rabbi Hannah Kapnik Ashar, Director of Faculty, the founder and director of Rahmana, a women's prayer initiative (Bronfman 2004);**
- **Community Managers Rafi Ellenson (a Hebrew College Rabbinical student and 2011 Bronfman alum) and Tal Toren (a 2015 Israeli alumna);**
- **Dr. Jonathan Marc Gribetz, associate professor in Near Eastern and Judaic Studies at Princeton University (Bronfman 1997); Dr. Alexander Kaye, Assistant Professor of Israel Studies at Brandeis, who joined as a guest teacher;**
- **Dr. Evan Parks, faculty member at Columbia University and now Bronfman's North American Director of Education (Bronfman 2005).**

The Fellows also participated in arts workshops led by contemporary Jewish artists including:

- **Anat Keinan, a multidisciplinary artist;**
- **Joshua Meyer, an acclaimed painter (Bronfman 1991) ; and**
- **Marisa Scheinfeld, photographer and founder of Borscht Belt Historical Marker Project.**

Israeli Senior Faculty included:

- **Zurit Buskila, who leads the Kolot Beit Midrash and teaches Jewish Studies at Ono Academic College;**
- **Rabbi Dr. Rani Jaeger, a research fellow, faculty member, and head of the recently formed Ritual Center at the Shalom Hartman Institute; and**
- **Rabbanit Dr. Michal Tikochinsky, one of the leading women Talmud scholars and educators in the world today.**

Due to the ongoing uncertainty around security in Israel, the 2024 Fellowship Summer for the North American Fellows took place primarily as a domestic program in Maryland, NYC, and Boston, with an optional trip to Israel at the end of July, giving the Fellows an unparalleled opportunity to delve deeply into the Jewish experience in both America and Israel.

During their time in Israel, the North American and Israeli Fellows met for some deep conversations in small groups, and listened to a session on Israeli-American relations led by former Bronfman Co-Director Mishael Zion. It was a meaningful time for both groups, as they shared thoughts, asked questions, and got to know each other as individuals.

Through the fall and winter of 2024, the North American Fellows continued to have monthly virtual meetings, and the Israeli Fellows had several in-person seminars in Israel.

We returned to doing in-person interviews in North America, and finalists also participated in virtual group workshops; in Israel, we conducted in-person group workshops and then virtual interviews.

Campus Commons: Building Bridges with Jewish Wisdom

2024 marked the launch of our first major new program in 25 years: Campus Commons: Building Bridges with Jewish Wisdom, an immersive leadership initiative for Jewish college students navigating deep divides on campus. Combining Jewish text study with social psychology and conflict resolution tools, the program empowers students to foster pluralistic, inclusive communities.

Campus Commons provided an immersive in-person retreat at Isabella Freedman, six virtual sessions, and support for creating implementation projects on home campuses where students learn real-world skills in bringing people together. The pilot cohort of 31 students with diverse Jewish backgrounds from 27 campuses across the U.S. and Canada reported extraordinary outcomes:

- **93% would recommend the program**
- **86% are more likely to seek out Jewish community**
- **97% gained greater insights into their strengths or motivations as a bridge builder**
- **100% said they are now likely to establish relationships with people who hold positions contradictory to their own**

We selected six students for campus implementation projects, which included a dinner series where students from a range of Jewish perspectives came together to cultivate connections and engage in Israel-Palestine dialogue; and a project in which students were encouraged to respond to posters around several campuses that posed engaging questions around pluralism and join in dialogue groups.

Most significantly, UJA-NY has awarded Bronfman a grant of \$250,000 to expand Campus Commons in 2025 to a total of 80 participants, in two cohorts of 40 each.

Growing Our Educational Team to Reach More Young People

Educators are a core part of our community, and our esteemed and pluralistic team of educators model open-minded engagement, serve as role models and mentors, and are as excited to learn from those they teach as our participants are to learn from them. On the North American side, Sophia Adler Varon joined the Bronfman team as Manager of Strategic Initiatives to lead Campus Commons in September, and Dr. Evan Parks joined as Director of Education in October. In Israel, Adi Feldman joined as Manager of Recruitment & Bogrim Community.

Strengthening Community and Elevating Our Impact

IN 2024, THE BRONFMAN FELLOWSHIP:

- Hosted 46 events reaching 1,646 people across North America and Israel
- Brought 7 Israeli alumni to the U.S. for a powerful speaking tour engaging 600+ people
- Published 45 first-person accounts from Israeli alumni post-October 7, offering an authentic lens into Israeli society
- Grew our mentorship and coaching programs, alumni gatherings, and educational team
- Deepened our public presence with workshops and panels at major Jewish convenings

Expanding Our Reach

Over the past 39 years, The Bronfman Fellowship has built a reputation for creating a unique Jewish learning experience for young people that is both heartfelt and intellectual – and most significantly – is transformative in shaping Fellows' long-term commitments to Jewish life and appreciation for Jewish pluralism.

At the same time, the Jewish community and the world have a growing need for educators and an educational model that opens young people up to self-inquiry, intellectual challenge, and an eagerness for dialogue with people who are different from them.

We have successfully raised our organizational profile in Israel and America and provided training and guidance to the field related to our expertise in pluralism, the Israel-America Jewish relationship, and the experiences of young Israelis. Our efforts have increased opportunities for us to host panels and workshops at high-profile conferences and convenings in both North America and Israel.

- Facilitated a discussion with a panel of 15 bogrim for approximately 50 attendees at a Jewish Funders Network event in Israel on "A War of Young People: Voices and Perspectives from Emerging Israeli Leaders."
- Provided Bronfman pluralism consulting for staff members of several Jewish non-profits.
- Presented on the bogrim reverse mentoring program for 30 community directors in Israel.

- Delivered a workshop about pluralism at the Prizmah Conference in February; our proposal was one of a small number selected out of hundreds.
- Led a number of training sessions about alumni engagement, mentoring and selecting talent at: The National Library, Tel Aviv University, Kaye College for Education & the Alumni Forum.
- Hosted two screening events of the documentary, *I Have a Name*, produced by the President of The Samuel Bronfman Foundation, Adam R. Bronfman, in New York City and San Francisco. Each screening event was attended by a diverse audience of alumni, parents, supporters and community partners, and featured a facilitated conversation with Bronfman CEO Becky Voorwinde and Adam Bronfman.

Growing Our Network of Leaders

Bronfman Community Developments

Our community programming helped to meet the moment and respond to critical needs. In Israel this included launching small regional groups for localized support and community, continuing our resiliency coaching and reverse mentoring. In the U.S. we also hosted a series of article discussion groups and text studies to explore the news and its context as realities unfolded.

We held a total of 46 events with 1,646 participants as follows:

- In North America, The Bronfman Fellowship hosted 32 events with approximately 1,260 participants in 2024 (this includes about 600 people who met with the bogrim during their U.S. speaking tour).
- In Israel, we hosted 14 events with 386 participants.

BOGRIM SPEAKING TRIP TO THE U.S.

In November 2024, the Fellowship brought seven young Israeli leaders from Amitei Bronfman to the U.S. to speak directly with American Jews about their personal experiences since October 7. They talked candidly about their hopes and fears for the future, while also bringing the stories and perspectives of American Jews back home with them to Israel. The historic group included Moshe Yehuda Akerman '15, Oz Bin Nun '15, Tali Griksharts '19, Maayan Or Hoch '19, Shiri Klayman '17, Alma Klemes '16, and Paz Bendek '13 as Staff. During their whirlwind tour in New York and Miami, the bogrim engaged in 12 speaking events, with approximately 600 people getting to hear their powerful stories firsthand.

Their speaking events included: Ramaz High School, SAR High School, Hunter College Hillel, Beit Rabban Middle School, Shefa Middle School, Park Avenue Synagogue B'nai Mitzvah class and parents, discussion at the home of Rachel Bluth '91, discussion at the home of Mojdeh Khaghan and Robert Danial in Miami, and a public event at Loft29 in NYC. The bogrim also participated in the North American Young Alumni Weekend.

The Bogrim Trip was sponsored by Kevin Botton '10, Debbie and Michael Joseph ('07 parents), Felix & Kira Sheinerman (Board member and '17 parents), and Carrie & Roberto Woldenberg (Board member and '22 parents). Four alumni families hosted the bogrim in NYC. ■

Alumni Venture Fund

Established more than 20 years ago, the Alumni Venture Fund (AVF) remains the only collaborative mini-grantmaking program of its kind that involves deliberations between Israelis and Americans for small alumni-led projects that advance the Fellowship's values. In 2024, the AVF recognized 10 diverse projects led by alumni from Israel and North America, representing cohorts from 2003 to 2020. Funds raised from our community enable us to provide peer-supported grants of \$2,000 for each project, totaling \$20,000 in distributed funds. The year's grant cycle was dedicated to the memory of Oriya Ayimalk Goshen z"l (Amitei Bronfman '19), who was killed in 2023 while serving in the IDF. Rachel Bluth '91 donated \$10,000 to the AVF as part of a matching campaign.

ALUMNI VENTURE FUND PROGRAM SPOTLIGHTS

Shiri Klayman's (Amitei Bronfman '17) AVF project is **"I Will Always Be: A Home for IDF Paramedics,"** which seeks to support the Israeli military paramedics community by offering psychological assistance, commemorating those who died in the line of service, and leading communal gatherings. The project is led by Shiri, a paramedic herself, and her friends who serve as military paramedics. The grant was used to create a website for the project.

Abby Fisher's (Bronfman '18) AVF project is **"Leave if No Response,"** a play based on Abby's own experiences. It deals with coming of age

with two identities, Jewish and queer, and seeks to present a wide spectrum of dynamic identity combinations. A production of the play will be held this summer in NYC. The AVF grant helped promote the play and strengthen its creative community. ■

Amplifying Israeli Voices

We have been publishing accounts written by young bogrim since October 7, to amplify the voices of our community to help demonstrate the complexity and multi-faceted nature of Israeli society. As of the end of 2024, the Fellowship had emailed 45 installments of these accounts to people in the wider Bronfman community. Examples of these accounts include a clinical social worker who struggled to create a safe space for her patients when she herself felt there was no safe space, a young woman who decided to move back to her family farm on the Gaza Envelope after being evacuated, and an account from a former radio news editor who was one of the first people to break the news of what was happening on October 7th.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive, with many people telling us they were more impactful than media coverage in understanding the war and the situation in Israel.

Alumni Mentorship

Through the Bronfman mentoring program, young alumni receive guidance not only in their professional lives but also in areas such as family, Judaism, and personal growth. By harnessing the power of this intergenerational community, this program helps alumni have an even greater impact on Jewish life and the world.

In North America, the seventh cycle of the Bronfman mentorship program was launched, with 11 pairs (22 participants) sharing wisdom with each other about jobs, family, and Jewish life.

In Israel, resiliency coaching was offered to alumni, with 13 bogrim receiving coaching and five bogrim therapists participating in training as coaches. American alumna Dr. Gavri Rosen Kellerman conducted the training based on her expertise in the science of positive psychology. The mentoring program there continued with three pairs (six participants), and the reverse mentoring program with one pair (two participants).

LA Learning Circle: Sharing Torah with Young Adults

For the first time ever, we launched a learning circle for a mix of alumni and other peers aged 25-32. This pilot brought together a mix of young adults in the LA area for monthly gatherings to study Jewish text, led by Rabbi Morris Panitz, and build community with time for dinner and socializing. We hope to expand these circles to other cities in future years.

Young Alumni Weekend and Shabbat Bogrim

We are deeply committed to maximizing impact for the first decade post-Fellowship Year, when alumni are making critical life and leadership decisions and seeking community. At this point in their lives, connection to the Fellowship can most strongly influence how young alumni access Jewish community and their decisions about how to use their skills, talents, and passions.

As part of this commitment, Bronfman hosts annual gatherings for both North American and Israeli young alumni:

- In North America, 65 college-age alumni attended our Young Alumni Weekend, November 15-17, at the Isabella Freedman Jewish Retreat Center in Connecticut.
- In Israel, about 100 people attended Shabbat Bogrim on July 12, a gathering for cohorts 2018 to 2023, along with nearly the entire educational team from the past six years.



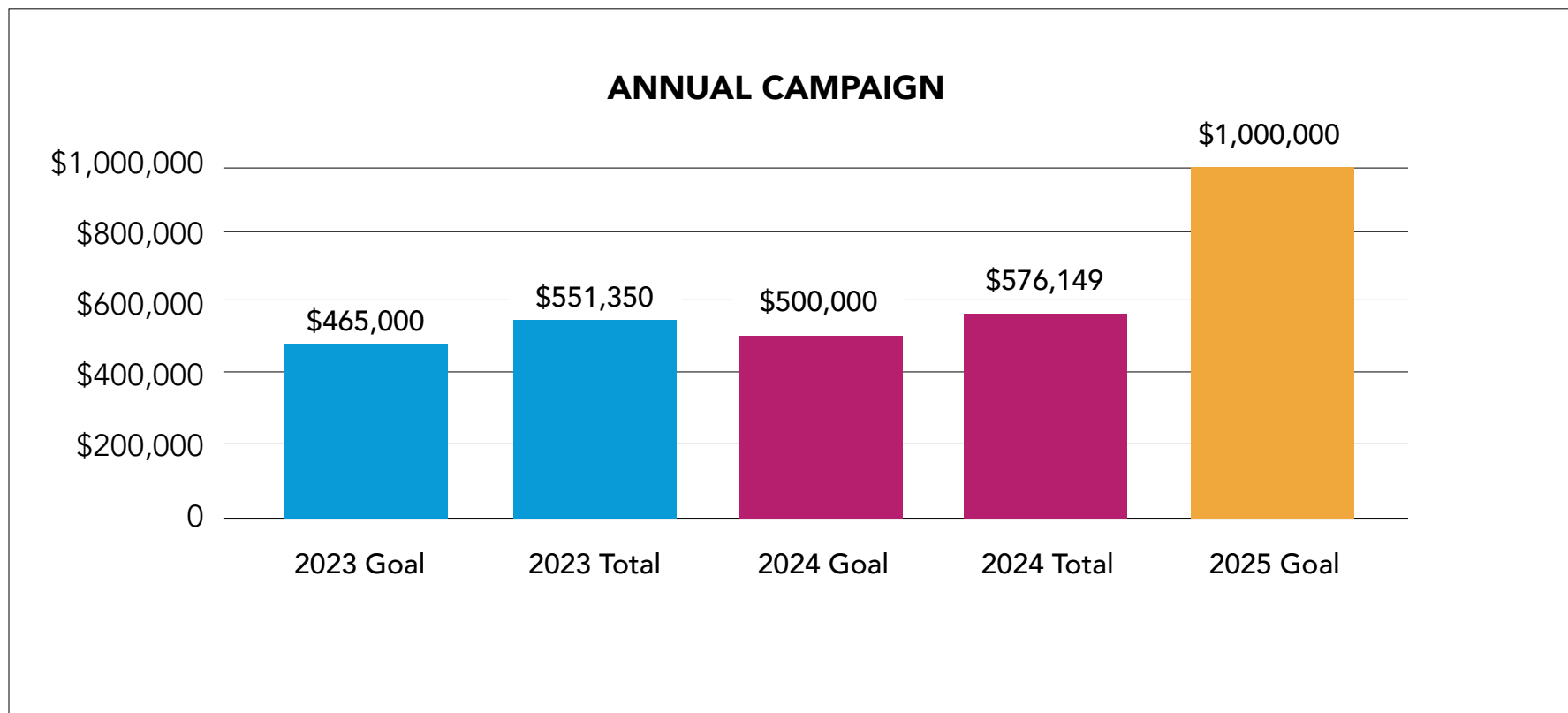

Strengthening Our Culture of Philanthropy

The Bronfman Fellowship rose to the challenge of successfully fundraising during a difficult year that included the ongoing war in Gaza and Lebanon and the presidential election. **We raised \$576,149 from 459 donors in 2024**, exceeding our fundraising goal of \$500,000.



2024 Fundraising Highlights

In 2024, we maintained a relationship-oriented approach to fundraising, focusing on authentic donor cultivation while also strengthening our fundraising infrastructure. In addition, our success has been strengthened by the Board's growing and active role in fundraising.

As we cultivate new institutional funders in addition to The Samuel Bronfman Foundation, we secured a grant from UJA-NY of \$95,000 to help launch Campus Commons, which was increased to \$250,000 in 2025 to support expansion of the program.

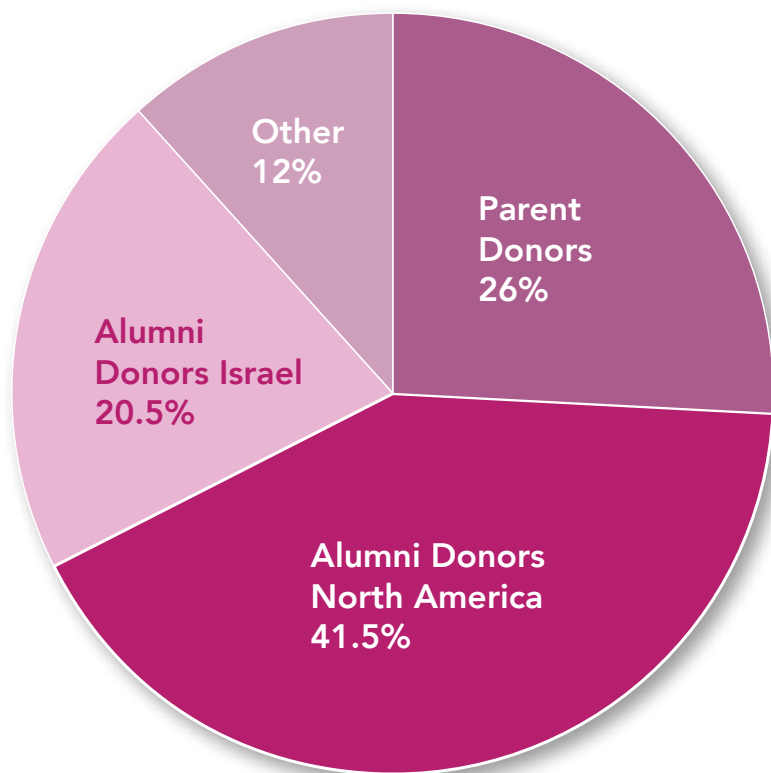
Peer to Peer Leadership.

Cultivating New Donors

Bronfman leadership, including Board members, are actively cultivating funders to support our new programming. During the year, we traveled across the country for meaningful profile-raising, donor cultivation events in NYC, Miami, Chicago, LA and San Francisco. Events ranged from intimate house parlors to larger scale “Taste of Campus Commons” gatherings.

In our first-ever Bronfman Giving Day (October 29, 2024), launched around a Board member’s matching gift, we raised \$58,158, with 147 alumni and parent donors making gifts. This exceeded our original goal of \$36,000. The phone-a-thon engaged ’24 Fellows and young alumni, who led the way as enthusiastic fundraisers. The response to their calls to alumni, parents, and family members was overwhelming.

For existing and new donors who care deeply about Bronfman’s mission, our new initiatives offer naming opportunities and other meaningful ways to designate support for specific projects.

Donors Support Thriving Visiting Artist Program.

Over the past three years, Bronfman has sparked creativity through its Visiting Arts program, which brings artists from a diverse range of mediums, to lead workshops for the Fellows. Rachel Farbiarz ’94 and her husband Alexander Laskey led with a three-year gift, which spurred Emil ’94 and Joanna Kleinhaus and Jacob Sadikman ’94 and Samara Enchin, to join the effort.

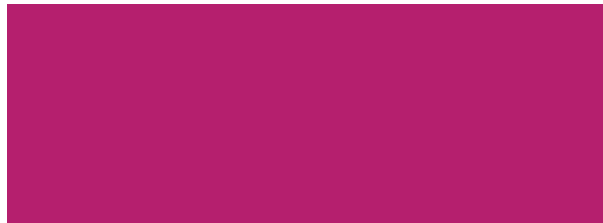


Total donations from

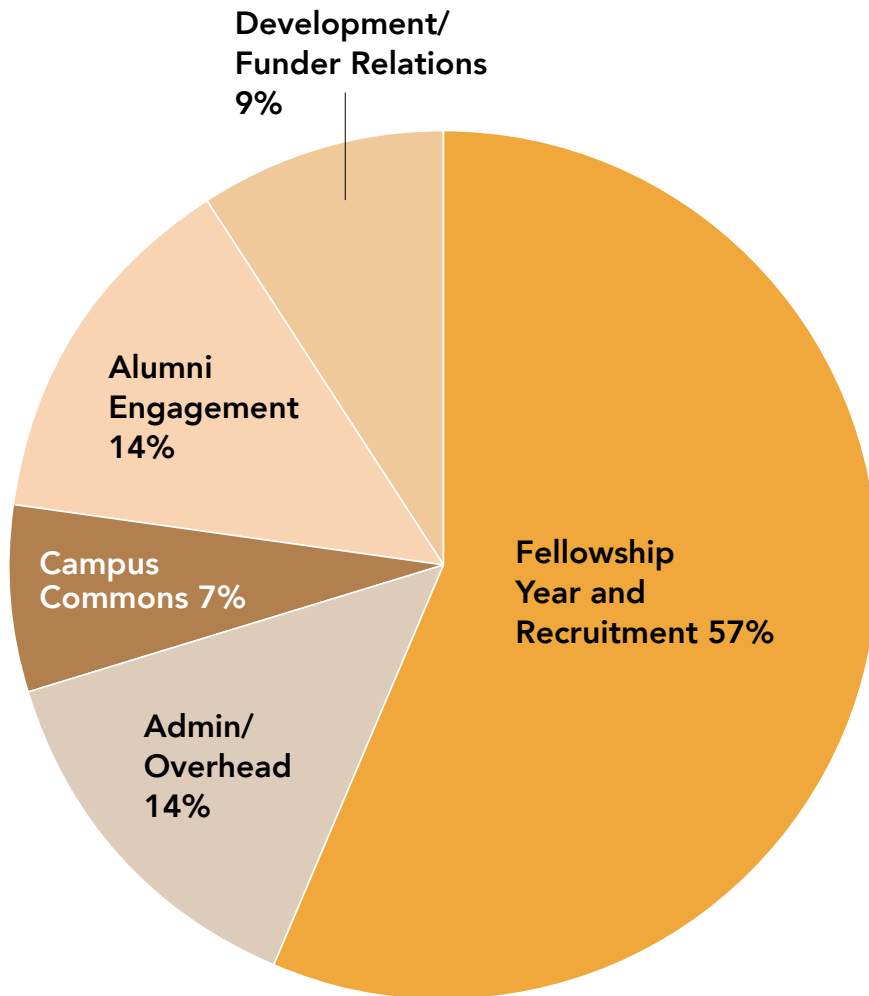
